Helping Our Neighbors Close to Home With a KIVA Loan

Rarely is the Outreach Ministry able to make a loan to someone in the United States. However, this month we were able to help Jennifer who owns a daycare business in Madison, Wisconsin. KIVA is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization. KIVA's mission is to connect people through lending to alleviate poverty. KIVA works with micro finance institutions on five continents to provide loans to people without access to traditional banking systems. The \$225.00 loaned to Jennifer was money that had been repaid on previous loans we have given.

Jennifer requested a \$7,000 loan to expand her daycare to serve more families. She was born and grew up in a small town in Honduras. From her mother she inherited a passion for working with and caring for children. She also learned the importance of teaching children values such as respect, empathy, equality, joy, friendship, and tolerance. The business description in Jennifer's own words follow:

"Mia's Family Daycare, a Wisconsin licensed daycare for 8 children, is located in my home in Madison, Wisconsin and is a place where children can receive quality care and education. We are accredited with a four star rating which certifies the quality service we provide. The reason I started my family daycare is because I had been training for a few years and decided it was time to start on my own. At the beginning, it was not easy. Parents leave their children in your care and being a new business, it is hard for them to trust, but my preparation, hard work and the trust of my first clients made the daycare start to grow and keep us at 100% of our capacity. In the last year my community has faced great challenges to find care for their children. Many parents have had to leave or change jobs because they cannot find care for their children. For this reason, I thought it is a good time for my daycare to grow and have a bigger space that can give me the opportunity to serve more families and fulfill my dream of growing my business."

The loan will be used to build a playground area which has a protective fence, purchase playground equipment suitable for children of different ages, cribs, tables and shelves for toys.

All of us at Pilgrim understand the importance of quality daycare for our children and grandchildren. KIVA gives us the opportunity to help someone close to Fond du Lac offer that service. One week electronic recycling event, Monday June 12 through Saturday June 17th.

The City of Fond Du Lac Municipal Service Center is collaborating with RecycleThatStuff.com to offer a one-week electronic recycling event beginning Monday, June 12th 2023 through Saturday, June 17th. This event will be located at the Municipal Service Center Bulky Waste Drop-Off Site at 490 Doty Street during regular hours of operation. Hours of operation can be found at www.fdl.wi.gov/public-works/bulky-waste-disposal/ under "Hours of Operation". This recycling event is available for <u>City of Fond Du Lac Residents Only</u>. Payment for items dropped is <u>CASH ONLY</u>, credit cards and checks will not be accepted.

•	Recycling Fee for Microwaves –	\$15.00
•	Recycling Fee for Large Copy Machines –	\$15.00

There are NO FEES for the Following items: Computers, Laptops, Hard Drives, Printers, Scanners, VCR & DVD Players, Fax Machines, Radio, Stereo, Typewriter, Keyboard, Mice, Circuit Boards, Cables, Cellular Phones, Telephones, Cameras, Camcorders, Cordless Power Tools, Video Games, Small Kitchen Appliances, and other small electronics.

Summer Sabbaths

For many, summer is a time for vacations – to get away from the routines. A Sabbath is a scheduled time without distraction to relax and reconnect with yourself, your family, your friends and God. A Sabbath can be any day of the week – it can be several hours or more than one day long. It's not so much about what **would** happen if you had undistracted time...it's about what **could** happen... face to face interaction, intentional listening, physical activity, conscious amazement at God's creations, discovering missed details...being alive and open to wonder.

June is another transition month when the pace of life seems to change. "Remember the Sabbath" is not a recommendation, it is a commandment. (The word vacation comes from the Latin for Freedom... need I say more?)

June 2 is National Cancer Survivors Day.

From the moment of diagnosis, a person becomes a survivor...aka "warrior". Celebrate that strength!

June 21 is our Summer Solstice

This year on a Wednesday, the longest day light day of the year and the official beginning of summer. This has been recognized and honored throughout history – lives connecting to the heavens and earth.

Viruses - The More You Know:

I started writing about viruses 3 years ago when the world experienced a whole new virus — COVID19. There was a lot of speculation, trial and error, misinformation, dangerous recommendations, outlandish thoughts and differing politics — adding to the fear and anxiety. I hope I was able to give you basic/solid info.

That said – COVID is now in the category of being an Endemic ("A disease regularly occurring within a community – widespread/usual/common"). Endemic diseases can still be dangerous and life changing for some people. And given germs' (bacterias, viruses, funguses) ability to change, I believe that it will not be another lifetime before we experience another "new" disease.

Pandemic or endemic - all those healthy lifestyle things and common sense are still important. History can teach - guards may be lowered, but should not be discarded all together.

Botanically, an avocado is a berry – so that makes guacamole a serving (or two...) of fruit! God is Great!

Tick Check!

The 2023 Tick season is already underway and word on the street is that we had a mild winter, so there will be more ticks this spring/summer/fall. (I don't know if that's true, but Ticks are most active when it's warm and humid – so, tis the season...)

Ticks are parasites that do not survive unless they latch on to a host – in this case with a bite and then they feed on that small amount of blood. They can carry disease that can infect the host (animals or humans) when they back-wash as they are feeding. Ticks are mainly found in tall grasses. Deer ticks are smaller is size and may carry Lyme's disease.

Wearing long pants with the cuffs tucked into socks or boots, and long sleeve shirts are deterrents. There are repellants on the market to spray on clothing that will help further in prevention. But even then, checking yourself and your pets after being outside is a good idea. A still moving tick is easier to remove!

I'm not sure why God made ticks. And of course I want everyone to enjoy being outside. By being aware and using a bit of common sense, tick checks will be quick and yield nothing!

WISE:

When someone says, "I have diabetes", people make different assumptions than if someone says, "I have anxiety". Both are caused by a chemical imbalance. Healthy diets, exercise, stress management, education and sometimes medication, all help manage both. With someone with Diabetes, we slowly back away with the piece of double chocolate cake without breaking eye contact... But we sometimes don't know how to respond to someone with a mental health challenge. Both carry stigmas.

The WISE Task Force continues to meet monthly as we educate ourselves about the importance of Mental Health – good mental health and challenged mental health - because both Physical and Mental Health are important and valid – and we don't want to do stigmas.

This summer – my prayer is that you will be so engaged in nature, impromptu get-togethers, little league, picnics, iced tea, watermelon, fresh veggies, a good book in the shade....that you forget to look at your phone.


