Hello Pilgrims!

I remember growing up my grandparents would always have an Advent calendar for me at their house. The calendar would hang on the wall and show a nativity scene. This was a tool they used to prepare me for Christmas by opening one of twenty-four little perforated "doors" built into the paper calendar. The doors were numbered and needed to be opened, one door each day, in order from the first day of December until Christmas Eve. Upon opening each door I would find a tasty piece of milk chocolate and a bible verse that tells a part of the Nativity story. As a child all I cared about was the chocolate. As an adult all my grandmother cared about was my learning about our faith and the birth of Jesus. I always wanted to get right to the chocolate and skip over the stories. I wish I had listened more to the stories my grandmother told me, had asked more questions, and ate even more chocolate. Now the holidays are still magical but half way through my fifth decade Christmas is not only magical, but also a bit, how should I say it? Sad? Tinged with grief? A time of longing for days gone by and the people who used to fill rooms with laughter who have long died and are dearly missed? That's it right there.

I still love the seasons of Advent and Christmas as much as, if not even more than, I did as a child. This is still truly a magical time of year. As a person of faith I now find the season of Advent not only as a time of waiting and preparation for the birth of Jesus and what that means for us today; I also find the 4 weeks before Christmas known as Advent as a time of remembrance and renewal. Where as a child I used to always look forward to what I was going to get for Christmas, as an adult I now always seem to look back at what I have lost. In my youth making my way through the Christmas holiday seemed so easy and filled with light. Now the holidays are also hard and filled with shadows of grief I don't 'always know quite what to do with.

They are there every year waiting for me like an old friend I don't see very often and now I don't know what to say to them anymore.

This is why we offer a Blue Christmas service. This year on December 21st, also known as the longest night, (AKA the winter solstice), you are invited to join us at 7 PM in the sanctuary for a service that speaks to those who have lost loved ones and are experiencing grief. It does not matter if you have lost someone to death this year or are grieving the loss of many over the course of several years like I am, you are most welcome. We will share a quiet and reflective time in worship with beautiful poetry and comforting music. We will let go of the stress of the holidays and simply be present in the moment with each other and our God. We will sing and pray and sit in the silence and find our rest in the blessed assurance that we are not alone.

What I wouldn't give to walk into my grandmother's house on Christmas Eve on the farm with the four living generations of my family from the days of my youth all crammed into that tiny little house. I remember the smells of Christmas candy and cookies, cakes and pies, baked ham and a Christmas goose, all in the same house with my great aunts' dominating perfumes, the smell brandy old-fashioned sweets, and too many cigarettes floating across the top of the room over far too many card games being played a little too late into the middle of the "O Holy Night." But that is no more. The idyllic days of my childhood have surrendered themselves to the reality of a world filled with suffering and violence, injustice and insurrection, oppression of the poor and the marginalized, wars and sickness. My father always threw around the phrase that the world was going "to hell in a handbasket" and now I believe him. I know how he likely felt when he said this often when I was a child who did not understand. And this feeling tells me we need the birth of Jesus now more than ever. The great coming of the Son of God, of hope eternal and everlasting, peace and justice for all of God's children. May it be so.

Our objectives are to promote understanding and compassion, reduce stigma through education and to support connections with local community agencies that advocate for those living with these challenges.

At Pilgrim we seek to be a community that cares for the whole person. We recognize that mental wellness is on a continuum and that stressors, loss, and life events can challenge us at any point. We recognize that many among us and those we encounter in our lives are dealing with mental health, brain disorders, and substance abuse challenges every day.

Our Congregation's atmosphere of openness and acceptance of people with the above concerns makes members, friends, and visitors more likely to feel safe and free from judgment. This acceptance and sense of safety can create a place of belonging where truly everyone, no matter where they are on life's journey towards mental wellness is welcome.

Pilgrim United Church of Christ Alternative Gift Fair is a

positive holiday experience that brings together our church and community members in a fun way to bypass the annual stress of holiday shopping and accumulation of "stuff" while honoring friends and relatives with donations that fit their values. The Alternative Gift Fair provides critical support for a diverse collection of local, national, and international nonprofit organizations that have established track records of helping people -diverting money to these charities rather than to department stores and malls. Each year we strive to feature 8 or 9 local, national and international organizations that we have researched and chosen. We strive to feature different organizations as much as possible in order to educate our shoppers about the diverse and extensive number of worthwhile nonprofit charities that exist. This *alternative* approach honors the spirit of giving. Gifts can range from any amount and are not disclosed to the recipient, making alternative gifts the perfect solution for co-workers, family, friends and the "hard to shop for" person.

Pilgrim Church's Alternative Gift Fair has raised a considerable amount of money for nonprofit charity organizations over the last 17 years. The Fair has supported a wide range of causes including organizations dedicated to environment, poverty, children, animals, nature, the arts, education, housing, women, hunger, refugees and more. We consider a successful fair one in which our shoppers are more educated about each charity's mission and good work.

Attendees are given a "shopping list" with all of the nonprofits who are represented at the fair. They can stroll among the booths and talk to featured nonprofit groups who will have information to share about their respective mission and current projects. As shoppers browse, they can match what charities they might support with the interests of the people on their gift list. Once complete, shoppers can check out and pay for all their gifts at once, eliminating any pressure to give to particular causes or groups at the individual booths. Shoppers may pay by cash or check and 100% of all donations go to the designated charities.

The shopper will receive a gift card for each monetary gift donated to a designated charity that they can share with their gift recipient. This card can then be addressed to "the honor of" or "memory of" a loved one or friend and can be signed by the shopper. Information is posted on the gift card about the charity's general mission and contact information.

Pilgrim Church's checkout eliminates the need for multiple transactions. After the event, Pilgrim will issue one check to each charity with <u>all</u> of their donations consolidated into one.

As one shops *alternatively*, your purchase is more than a gift to just the recipient. Your choice emphasizes community, outreach, service and justice. It is a celebration of non-material values. It honors the true meaning of Christmas.

This year's Alternative Gift Fair will be on Sunday, December 3, 2023.

UNION OF CONCERNED SCIENTISTS

The Union of Concerned Scientists was founded in 1969 by scientists and students at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. That year, the Vietnam War was at its height and Cleveland's heavily polluted Cuyahoga River had caught fire. Appalled at how the United States government was misusing science, the UCS founders, including Henry Kendall and Kurt Gottfried, drafted a statement calling for scientific research to be directed away from military technologies and toward solving pressing environmental and social problems.

The organization has remained true to that founding vision. Throughout its history, UCS has followed the example set by the scientific community: to share information, seek the truth, and let the findings guide conclusions. UCS uses science to help people, whether it's working for change at the policy level, or helping individuals understand what's happening in their neighborhoods.

By mobilizing scientists and combining their voices with those of advocates, educators, business people, and other concerned citizens, UCS has built a reputation for fairness and accuracy and amassed an impressive history of accomplishments.

Wins for a healthy planet and safer world:

- Strengthened US fuel efficiency standards to eliminate almost half of all emissions from new cars and trucks by 2025.
- Encouraged the growth of clean energy through renewable energy standards in 29 states and Washington, DC.
- Reduced US and Russian nuclear stockpiles through the passage of the New START Treaty.
- Blocked anti-science legislation and protected bedrock environmental laws such as the Clean Air Act

RAWtools

RAWtools is a Grassroots Organization with the mission to "Disarm Hearts and Forge Peace". From their website, "Our nation has been through a variety of horrific events surrounding gun violence, and it has brought the conversation to the forefront...It has largely become a binary conversation of either more guns or more laws. RAWtools wants to open a new option, a third way: What if we made a commitment to solve our problems without guns and violence?"

RAWtools has several programs: Swords to Plowshares – the Sword to Plow program allows someone to donate their gun(s) to RAWTools and receive a garden tool from that gun for free. RAWtools keeps any remaining parts to make more tools or items to raise money for their work in nonviolence training, resource connection, and violence prevention. They legally disable the gun according to Federal ATF guidelines and provide paperwork upon request that a gun has been disabled. "Turning guns into garden tools connects our programs and enables storytelling – stories of magnificent transformation as well as the deep trauma of grief and loss."

They are growing a "Disarming Network" that helps "people connect with others who have the knowledge, resources, and safe spaces to disable guns," and then safely send the gun parts to RAWtools. (In Wisconsin there are people in Madison and Milwaukee who are part of this network.)

War No More nonviolence training. "We believe there are tools to resolve conflicts that don't involve violent weapons." RAWpower Workshops:

Tools for a Third Way can include:

Restorative Justice

De-Escalation

Bystander Intervention

Circle Process

Open Dialogue

Mental Health First Aid

At this time, workshops are offered in Colorado, are tailored to any group and include theory and practice.

Vine and Fig is based on Micah 4:4 "...everyone will sit under their own vine and under their own fig tree, and no one will make them afraid." "This is initiative to encourage us to look inward and address the triggers in our hearts that lead to violence, such as fear and hate." And connects with community resources like The Rebels Project (a national victim support group for those who

have endured violence, resilience yoga and community gardening as a response to trauma.

RAW is War spelled backwards. They believe that guns have no place in conflict resolution. And, "By using weapons to make garden tools and other hand tools, we are creating a symbol for change."

Advent begins December 3 - Happy New Year!

To be prepared means to be "in a suitable state for an activity, action, or situation; duly equipped, completed, adjusted or arranged, as for an occasion or purpose" (dictionary definition). Advent is all about preparing for the coming of Jesus — and (in my head) about welcoming the new year...new options...new ideas...new opportunities...each day brings the unexpected and I may not be as prepared as I think I should be, but I am enough.

We Welcome the Returning Sun and National Flashlight Day

In the dark silence comes whisperings of new beginnings. December 21st is the shortest daylight day of the year. (8 hours, 58 minutes and 15 seconds...) in this area. Personally, I'm not a fan of extended physical darkness but there can be a quiet softness in the darkness – a time of rest and restoration for the earth and in us. God is here...strengthening, guiding, supporting, and loving. I celebrate December 22nd – because that daylight is just a tad longer, and the light at the end of the tunnel.

"Happiness can be found, even in the darkest of times, if one only remembers to turn on the light." Albus Dumbledore

Sleep and Blue screens

And thinking of longer night/dark time hours, it's easy to watch television and play on tablets in the evenings. Looking at those screens can affect how a person sleeps.

VERY simply - In response to darkness, brains make the hormone melatonin. It's the same hormone that causes bears to hibernate and birds to fly south for the winter. An increase in melatonin causes a feeling of sleepiness. Light – natural sunshine and specifically the blue wavelength light in the spectrum – (think a prism as light passes through and splits into colors – the blue one) messes with the body's ability to make melatonin. It just so happens that "human made" blue light sources are in screens - televisions, smartphones, tablets, gaming systems, computer

monitors – as well as fluorescent and LED bulbs. Both natural and artificial blue light can boost alertness and mental sharpness, but too much of it may keep a person from being able to "wind down" at the end of the day.

This is an awareness for both youth and adults who have difficulty falling or staying asleep. The recommendation from sleep experts is to "turn off or dramatically cut back screen time 2-3 hours before bedtime". There are apparently blue light-blocking glasses and blue light filtering apps as options, or for example books, puzzles, decaf tea and conversation, cribbage, phone a friend, music, journaling, writing a snail mail letter...during the time of relaxation and reflection and we wait for the return of the sun.

December is 3-9 is National Handwashing Awareness Week

I have written ad nauseum about handwashing as a simple illness prevention practice. Check out the bulletin board for more reminders. Historically, the number of upper respiratory illnesses (influenza, RSV, COVID, the common cold...) increases during the months of December and January. Tis the season for gatherings in poorly ventilated areas with grazing type food. Be safer than average.

And, a reminder that everyone can get 4 free COVID test kits through the mail by calling 1-800-232-0233 or online, https://www.covid.gov/tests. Every COVID illness has a possibility of developing into "Long COVID", and all viral illnesses spread easily and quickly.

Gift Giving Reminders

When choosing gifts for children: Look for labels that assure you the toys have passed a safety inspection – "ATSM" means the toy has met the "American Society for Testing and Materials" standards. And, an easy rule when choosing toys for toddlers, - if the piece can fit inside a toilet paper roll, it is not appropriate for kids under the age of three.

Celebrations: Linda has completed her chemotherapy and was present at the council meeting. Welcome back Linda!


