#### Hello Pilgrims!

The entire month of March fell within the season of Lent with Holy Week and Easter Sunday right at the end. Lent is a time of preparation and meditation on the gifts of the resurrection. The entire month of April falls within what the church traditionally refers to as the Easter season, or the "50 great days of Easter," after which comes Pentecost, which means fiftieth in Greek. The Easter season is a time of celebration and proclamation of the gifts of the resurrection.

As we move from preparation and meditation towards celebration and proclamation I want you to consider this question: What are the gifts of the resurrection in your life?

This is a vital question for our faith and the answers are different for everyone. One gift I proclaim is something I share almost every Sunday before we pray in worship:

"The power of God is real and the power of prayer is real; And yet, we do not pretend to control, nor certainly understand God's power; And yet, when we take the time to share with each other what God has done for us that we cannot do for ourselves, we come to the inevitable conclusion that the power of God is real and the power of prayer is real. Hallelujah." This is my experience.

Many times I have shared little pieces of my journey into sobriety. 20 years sober and much of it is still a mystery. Did God get me sober? I believe so. Why do others fail to get sober, relapse, suffer, and even die of their addictions? I do not know. I refuse to blame God or the addict as that makes no sense to me. What I do know is that somewhere in the struggle to find myself born into a new life free of my vices I found God and people who knew God far more than I ever did. People who offered me countless helping hands that helped to dig me out of the pit of my despair into a new life with my hope restored. A living awareness of the Great Advocate the gospel of John talks about. A connection to the Spirit of Truth that affords us the ability to see the world spiritually. A point of view that allows us to discover just how really connected us all are – the physical and the spiritual, the emotional and the logical. A view that empowers us to be the countless helping hands people need to help dig them out of the pits of their despair into a new life with their hope restored.

For me that's how it works. I believe we are all pilgrims on a journey, a pilgrimage that draws us away from our vices and closer to God. I believe we will find God in the hearts and minds of those we meet along the way. Then we are called to help others as we have been helped. Joining together with others (the church) to help the whole world and all of creation to move from the pits of our despair into a new life with hope restored.

It is in this way that we embrace one of the greatest gifts of the resurrection, the ability to help others which in turn helps ourselves. You see the power of the resurrection is not one-way transaction, it's an endless cycle of hope being lifted up out of the depths of our despair. A gift that is free for everyone without restriction, such is the unimaginable width and breadth of God's grace.

Join us for the 7 weeks of the Easter season that begin on Resurrection Sunday (March 31) as we identify and meditate on a different gift of the resurrection each week. Ask yourself: **What are the gifts of the resurrection in my life?** Together we will discover the grace and glory of God as surely as Mary Magdalene did in the garden on that fateful day.

#### April is National Alcohol Awareness month

I don't need to list a bunch of statistics on alcohol use in Wisconsin – we've all heard them before. I think the operative word here is "Awareness"... Being aware of the role alcohol plays in our lives. Are there routine times we reach for alcohol? Do we expect alcohol to be provided at gettogethers? Do we look forward to drinking alcohol – maybe even planning to drink more on say, weekends? Are there times we "need" a drink? Has anyone said anything concerning about our drinking? (If one person says something we can easily brush it aside – if 2 people say something, it may be time to think about personal priorities, and the "why" behind the decision to drink alcohol.)

Awareness is key. And if you think you may need help making changes, you can start with your Primary Care Provider, or go to the National Institute of Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism: <u>https://</u> <u>www.niaaa.nih.gov</u> for information.

#### April is Poison Prevention Month.

Remember Mr. Yuk? (Round green face... tongue sticking out...) *There are brochures on the table in the Narthex with poison prevention information and stickers – please help yourself!* 

**Check out the bulletin board** for information about clean - cleaning products. For those with lung diseases like asthma or COPD, and even "just" allergies, - aerosols and scents (e.g. cleaning products, perfumes, body sprays, smoke, paint) can cause spasms; making it difficult (impossible) to draw a breath. The rule is: *If you can smell it, it's already in your lungs*.

It's how we take care of each other...

#### April is National Health Care Decisions Month:

Bringing awareness to the fact that 95% of people have thought about their health care priorities, and only 17% have done something about it – namely talking with family and filling out a Power of Attorney for Health Care (POAHC).

*"It's about what matters to you, not what's the matter with you."* Talking about what's important and designating who can speak for us if we are unable, is a gift to all those who love. And that's one way we care for each other.

#### 5210 Every Day

This is a new(er) national initiative aimed at healthy habits in youth as well as adults. It encourages daily:

5 or more servings of fruits and vegetables (fruit or veggie at each meal and for snacks)

2 hours or less recreational screen time (schedule intentional recreational screen time – like family movie time. No screens (TV, Computer etc.) in the bedroom.)

1 hour or more of physical activity (walking, exercising, playing)

0 sugary drinks (more water and limiting even 100% fruit juice to ½ cup or less)

Regarding juices - Juice products labeled "ade", "drink", or "punch" often contain less than 5% juice. The only difference between these juices and soda is that they are fortified with Vitamin C. Energy drinks are not sports drinks, and should never replace water during exercise – both contain lots of sugar...and chemicals....

One hour of physical activity per day does not sound like much, but I think you'd be surprised if you formally kept track of your activity for a week. Unless you go to a gym or follow an exercise program, a full hour/day – even doing 2 - 1/2hour time blocks – can be elusive.

These recommendations are starting points at being intentional about healthy habits that support a strong immune system. It's another awareness and a chance to build on habits that may become second nature and feel good – mind, body, and spirit.
