"You shall love God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength, and the second is like it: Love you neighbor as yourself. Everything in the law and the prophets hangs on these two commandments." (Matthew 22:37-40)

This last Friday, I had the privilege of marrying Max and Lucia. It was a wonderful service and when I spoke to Max and Lucia, I spoke about love. For them I spoke about "love in marriage", but to you, today, I want to tell you about "love in commitments." So here goes:

I have heard it said that imitation is the highest form of flattery. I am sure you have all seen your own children or your grandchildren imitate you or someone else. Lots of times we see it in church when we pull out our hymnal to sing and the child beside us does the same. The hymnal may be upside down and on the wrong page, but that child is imitating those they care about and respect. They are learning one little part of what it is to worship together. Learning by imitation. I have seen, lately, people who have learned by imitation. Those who say "He has his Mother's sense of humor" or "She's a storyteller, like her Father." At some point in our lives, all of us have someone who imitates us. So how do we pass on the good in us rather than the bad?

God understands, better than we realize, we need to learn by imitation, by doing, by practicing. It is one of the first ways we learn and develop as youngsters and on into adulthood. That is why God has given us so many opportunities, and methods of learning and passing these lessons on to others.

One of the biggest opportunities God has given us, is learning the lessons of those who have gone before us. Not only do we learn from the stories that were passed down through the Bible, the stories of the Old Testament, but we especially learn by the things that Jesus said and did. Jesus not only talked the talk, he walked the walk. He was an example to those around him and to future generations of how we might live

out a Godly life.

The Old Testament gives us the Ten Commandments, which we understand are laws given to us to follow. But Jesus tells us that the greatest commandment is that "You shall love God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength, and the second is like it: Love you neighbor as yourself. Everything in the law and the prophets hangs on these two commandments." (Matthew 22:37-40)

"You shall...love." These days, the word "love" is greatly abused. It is important to remember that the primary component of biblical love is not affection, but commitment. To love, as we are commanded in the Bible, is much deeper than whether we have warm feelings of gratitude or affection towards God. To love is to seek well-being for the other, even if you find that person intolerable or completely unlikable. Love does not overlook wrong or injustice.

Such love—deep commitment, an unwavering bond—this is the love of our Creator for us, and it is the way we are called to imitate, to practice, to live and learn together and apart. Christ empowers us to live out of his love for us. And as we live out that love, we can see others who want to imitate this love God has given to us.

So don't be surprised, as you continue to be faithful followers of Christ, when the ones whom you have shown love to, start to imitate you. When your grandchild chooses to come to church on their own, or that kid who once cried through service, wants to be Joseph in the Christmas play. All these type of acts, these imitations, are signs of flattery toward you and your love of God.

May God's love continue to give us insight to how we are to live out a Godly life worth imitating.

We know you will enjoy reading about her accomplishments and years of dedication to the Catholic Church. We are blessed to have her as part of our church family.

AWARD BIO

Mary Ann Otto is the 2025 recipient of the Saint Joseph Stewardship Award for Distinguished Service presented by the board of the International Catholic Stewardship Council (ICSC). The award will be presented during ICSC's 63rd annual conference to be held September 21 to 24 at the Hyatt Regency in Chicago, IL

Mary Ann spent thirty-five years in parish and diocesan positions before retiring from full time ministry in 2022. Holding a Masters Degree in Theological Studies, she acted as the Director of Faith Formation for all ages in a variety of parish settings. Invited to serve as the Stewardship and Special Projects Director for the Diocese of Green Bay, Mary Ann spent nine years working with parish teams to develop practical plans based on the spirituality of stewardship. During this time, she developed two resources including a small group series entitled *Be Not Afraid* and a parish stewardship team retreat named *Light the Fire*.

Mary Ann connected with the ICSC as a diocesan director and served on its board of directors for six years as well as on its executive committee offering many presentations at its annual conferences. She has also presented nationally as well as making three trips to the Philippines to work with diocesan and parish teams promoting the spirituality and best

practices of stewardship.

Returning to parish ministry and serving as the Evangelization and Discipleship Director at St. Mary and St. Joseph Parishes in Appleton, WI., she worked with a Spirit-filled discipleship team. They were inspired by Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation-Joy of the Gospel and created a professional small group video series called Be Like Jesus Live Like Jesus which has an international presence. Mary Ann currently serves as the author, co-producer and president of Be Like Jesus – Live Like Jesus, INC. She also continues to offer workshops for diocesan and parish teams promoting Gallup StrengthsFinder, evangelization and discipleship.

Mary Ann is an Associate Member of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet and she and her husband Jeff are blessed with five children and nine grandchildren.

7thEvery year there are changes to Medicare benefits and supplements, and the yearly opportunity to make any changes is October 15 - December 7.

These people are the go-to people for current, accurate, non-advertisement information about Medicare and types of supplements. They do not sell anything - they educate about options.

Breast Cancer Awareness Mont

For the record...A person does not have to have a family history to get breast cancer. And caffeine, deodorants, implants, microwaves, or cell phone overuse do not cause breast cancer.

Cancer is defined as "an uncontrolled growth of abnormal cells". The abnormal cells form a "glob" of cells - and sometimes pieces break off and travel to other areas of the body to form new "globs". Routine Mammograms continue to be the gold standard test for early detection. The general recommendation for screening is yearly between 45-54 years old and then every 1 -2 years after the age of 55. This is a conversation to be had with a Primary Care Provider as personal factors such as family history, breast density, history of chest radiation, a history of breast cancer, and/or hormonal therapy, may change the recommended frequency of testing. Breast Cancer deaths have been declining since 1989. Regular screening, early detection

and better treatments are being attributed to this (wonderful) fact.

October is National Healthy Lung Month

As the earth prepares for winter, environmental pollen, dust and molds are all increasing. Allergy symptoms can trigger asthma attacks as well as increased sinus and chest congestion. According to the American Lung Association, if someone is using their rescue inhaler more than 3X/week, their asthma is not well controlled and they should be talking with their Primary Provider. Please be reminded that if you can smell it, it's already in your lungs. Stronger scents like perfumes, candles, room "fresheners", dryer sheets, cigarette smoke, and cleaning product smells can trigger lung "spasms" in some people. As you move indoors and gather in closed spaces, be aware of this possible sensitivity.

Sharing

By the time you read this, we will have heard about updated vaccine recommendations from the CDC, and pharmacies/hospitals/clinics will have some direction. (In the past, these recommendations came out during the spring or summer, but there have been delays due to multiple changes in the advisory committee) There's been more conflicting reports about vaccines, and I'm concerned about the health of everyone - especially the vulnerable - during this cold and virus season. For the record, I think everyone should be able to get vaccines, and tho pro-vaccine, I respect each persons' right to their own decision. Two facts I want you to remember: Viruses can be passed to other people before symptoms start. (an incubation period) and the vulnerable generally don't get sick from other vulnerable people - they get sick from otherwise healthy people who have not been vaccinated or don't take precautions. The number of upper respiratory viral illnesses is already increasing in Fond du Lac - mainly covid and general "colds". Please take care of yourself and those around you! Share your knowledge, share your positive attitude, share your time, share your beliefs, share your lunch, but don't share your germs! Check out the bulletin board for more information.

10 Ways to Practice Self-Care as an act of Kindness to yourself.

It is very easy to feel mentally exhausted in today's world. We push ourselves from sunup to sun down with various commitments and beliefs that things in our life need to be done a certain way. When we begin to ignore our own self-care we can fall pray to burnout, nervous exhaustion, physical and mental health issues and substance abuse. We need to show ourselves the same kindness that we would show to others in our lives. Studies suggest that practicing self-care can boost happiness, enhance productivity and foster emotional health. It can also reduce the risk of chronic health conditions.

Self care does not have to be expensive or complicated, here are 10 simple ways you can practice kindness and self care for yourself.

Create affirmation cards, write positive statements and place them around your living space. Carry them in your purse or pocket so you can pull them out while you are waiting for something and read a positive thought to yourself.

Connect with a friend, call or write someone who you may not have spoken to for awhile. It is great to send and receive mail from a friend. Don't isolate, spend time in community with others.

Create a mood boosting playlist, music can deeply impact you emotional state. The right tunes can lift your spirit instantly.

Join a community group, if you are seeking connection and can't get out as much as you would like, think about joining an on line group, such as a book club, gardening group, on line yoga or mindfulness group.

Journal your thoughts and experiences, writing down our thoughts and feelings can assist us in processing them and letting them go.

Schedule yourself a "nothing" day, sometimes we need to give ourselves permission to do nothing. It is okay to have a day where we relax, refresh both mentally and physically

Spend time outdoors, time outdoors reduces the risks of depression and can boost our serotonin levels and Vitamin D.

Start a new book, put the technology down and begin reading a new book. If concentration is a struggle, chose a book like Chicken Soup for the Soul where a story may only be 2-3 pages. Give yourself permission to read small amounts at a time.

Meditate, incorporating meditation into your daily routine can bring you peace, calm and balance.

Remember that Self-care is not a one time event, but a continuous practice that we all benefit from. If it doesn't work today, try again tomorrow because YOU ARE WORTH IT

HOLY FAMILY WARMING SHELTER

Pilgrim UCC will have a second offering on Oct. 26th to help support the Holy Family Warming Shelter. The Shelter opened in 2023 to offer single men and women experiencing homelessness a place of safety and respite during the winter months. In 2024-2025 the Shelter served 100 individuals and 19,940 meals. In addition to warm meals and a place to sleep, neighbors have access to laundry and bathroom facilities and community resources. The Shelter has space for 36 persons per night. Annual expenses for the Shelter are approximately \$200,000 for staffing, utilities and other needs—the equivalent of \$35 per neighbor per day. You can help support the Shelter through the Pilgrim collection, directly to Holy Family, the Amazon wish list and/or meal contributions. Please be generous!

Pill Bottle Collection Drive to Begin in October

Did you know that amber pill bottles—commonly used for medications—are too small for curbside recycling? Fortunately, they can be reused in meaningful ways.

In many parts of the world, medications are dispensed in whatever container is available—sometimes just a scrap of paper. Clean, resealable pill bottles are a

luxury that can make a real difference in safe medication distribution.

Matthew 25: Ministries, based in Ohio, accepts donations of clean, empty, recapped, label-free, and residue-free plastic pill bottles. These bottles are included in shipments of medical supplies, helping improve healthcare in developing countries while also reducing waste.

Your Creation Justice Green Team is making it easy to participate. **Starting in October, a collection container will be available in the church coat room for donated amber bottles.** All collected bottles will be shipped to Matthew 25: Ministries.

✓ What to Donate

- Amber prescription bottles only
- Remove all labels completely
- Wash bottles in soapy water to remove sticky residue
- Ensure bottles are clean, dry, and capped

If bringing bottles in a baggie or box, please empty them into our container and take your bag or box home. This is a trial run. If donated bottles are not clean and ready to ship, we will discontinue the collection.

Why composting matters.

When food decomposes in landfills, it produces methane—a greenhouse gas over 25 times more potent than carbon dioxide. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, food waste is the third-largest source of methane emissions in the U.S., trailing only petroleum production and livestock manure. This invisible threat accelerates climate change and undermines efforts to build a sustainable future.

For the same reason, organic waste like pumpkins, apples and gourds doesn't properly break down in oxygen deprived landfills. IInstead of putting these items in curbside trash, the city recommends that you take them to the brush and grass drop off site on north Doty Street. Please do not put these items in the church bins as they are too bulky.

Composting is one way to reduce food scraps in the landfill. The compost bin on the back side of the church is for everyone. Some users freeze their scraps at home, others keep a covered bucket in the garage. Find a way that works for you and dump it in when you visit church. If you have a question, ask a Green Team member.

Unwanted string lights.

People are asking, and the answer is yes, the Green Team is planning to collect non working and unwanted lights again this year. Look for a collection box in the entry starting the Sunday after the ham dinner.



August 18, 2025

Present: Jim Bently, Linda Stutz (via phone), Pastor Jeannie, Patty Minter, Ron Mcreedy, Donna Jost, Fran Schmid, Dixie Sullivan, Avery Geiger, Wendy Ellison, Steven Wichihowski, Guest- Michael Friedel

Welcome and Quorum: Jim established there was a quorum present at 6:00 PM

Opening Prayer: Pastor Jeannie opened the meeting with a prayer.

Michael Friedel: As the Sunday School Coordinator wanted to give an update of where Sunday School and youth education is going. The Christian Education committee has been discussing how best Sunday School can meet the needs of the congregation and increase the attendance. One thing they are exploring is changing the time of Sunday School perhaps to offer it during the church service. Sunday School teachers and shepherds thought this was a good idea. A survey will be conducted with the families of potential students. Sunday School would be in 2 classrooms to seperate the older children from the younger. There will be a need for 5 Sunday School teachers and 5 shepherds.

Michael also discussed coordinating youth groups and activities once a month for Junior and Senior high students. Pastor Jeanne will be conducting confirmation classes every other Wed. So far there are 4 students signed up. Dixie read the mission statement for Christian Education.

Secretary's Report: After review of the June Council Minutes and the corrections made the minutes were accepted as corrected, the minutes were approved with unanimous consent.

Treasurers Report: Report attached. This was a good month when it comes to what came in vs. what was spent out. This month we are in the black. Donna did pay out the Blanket Sunday funds. Donna reported that offerings for the month of July were up, mostly because checks of those that pay annually came in. Also to be noted is that dues to the NE Association have increased this year. Also income vs. expenditures is up as well.

Pastor's Report: June 13 – August 17. Report attached.

Pastor met with with 89 people for short walk-in counseling and advising and meetings. Attended 15 meetings of various ministries/committees. One small child was baptized - family are non members. They want to be part of the the church but their child has many issues.

Vice President's Report: Linda reported that a new administrative assistant has been hired and will begin on Sept. 2, 2025. We are not giving out her name at this point as she has to notify her current boss. She does have experience as an administrative assistant currently. She was very impressive at the interviews and was our 1st choice. We are excited for her to start!

All positions at Pilgrim are currently filled except the seated pastor.

Pastor Jeannie also has signed an extension to remain as our interim pastor.

OLD BUSINESS:

The one day seminar on September 18th "Faith Partner for Creating Hope 2025 was approved with unanimous consent to pay out for WISE members to attend.

Church organ: As the current organ is aging out and it is getting difficult to obtain replacement parts. To purchase a replacement organ it would cost around \$100,000. Chris Deaner-Rogers provided information as to the issues and the need to purchase a new one in the near future. Discussion ensued regarding the need to establish a committee to review the information given by Chris and also solution /options. Jim requested that he and Linda have permission to gather a group of members to be part of this committee. The council agreed with unanimous consent.

New Banner Placement: Avery and the Property/Maintenance committee will move the banner to the agreed upon placement.

NEW BUSINESS:

Note Bird: Pastor Jeannie brought up a new app that other churches use to keep track of and produce lists/ reports of care notes for administrative purposes. The app would be used by the Parish Nurse, Pastor, Children and Youth Education coordinator. Personal confidential information would not be available to others but each individual would have access to that information for their own records. This also works in coordination with Breeze but only statistical info such as birthdays, anniversaries, membership and would be down loaded for record keeping etc. Cost for use of this App is \$204/year for 2 people, \$372 for 4 people. Discussion ensued. The council requested more information on this App. Pastor Jeannie will provide more information for the next council meeting Also will seek advice from Neal Seiglaff. This will be added to **Old Business** for the next month's agenda.

SAA (Sexual Addiction Anonymous: Pastor Jeannie passed on a request to the Executive Committee by member and director of the United Way that SAA be able to hold their meetings at our church. There are 4-6 individuals that would attend meetings. Meetings would be held Thursdays at 6 PM. There are no sex offenders or predators in the group. The group is for individuals who suffer from a sexual addiction. The group leader, Hayden, offered to come to a council meeting and explain the program and answer any questions. The council will add this to the September agenda for Hayden to provide information and answer questions before making a decision at the next council meeting.

Linda made a motion that the title/job description for Sunday school coordinator be changed to Children and Youth Ministries Coordinator. An updated job description was reviewed. The salary will be adjusted by combining Sunday School Coordinator and Youth leader to \$10,000.

School Coordinator compensation of \$9000 and the Youth Ministries money line of \$1000 for an annual salary of \$10,00. Avery 2nd the motion. The motion passed with no opposition by unanimous consent.

Donated Quilt. Deb Wamser is donating a hand made quilt to be raffled off for the benefit of children and youth ministries. Discussion ensued regarding the need to get a state license to have this raffle. Due to the fair market value it is necessary to have a license. Jim will make the application. Suggestion was made to sell raffle tickets for the quilt at Fondue Fest. Due to time constraints this will not be possible. It will take 4 weeks to obtain the license. Donna will look into tax ramifications.

Stephanie Jackson will embroider a chalice and bread on cloths that are used to cover the communion bread and juice

The worship ministry will continue to try to have Sunday School students acolyte the first Sunday each month. Linda will ask Michael Friedel to create a list.

Celebration Sunday (previously called Rally Day) will be on Sunday, September 7, The theme is, "Around the World". Sue and Mary will provide a breakfast entree for this potluck event.

- 2. Discussion of Celebration Sunday, Sept 7 concerning food donations from ministry members.
- 3. Michael will be sending a survey to Sunday School parents in August. The survey will include preferred time of Sunday School classes.
- 4. **Adult education:** There was discussion on the possible impact of Sunday School time changes on Adult Forum. Monday September 8, is is the welcome luncheon for Adult forum. Completed brochures for Adult Education for Fall 2025 will be available for Family Fun Night.
