Journeying With Jeannie

Dear Beloved Members and Friends of the Church, In recent weeks, many of us have been carrying a sense of heaviness. The news has been difficult to watch. Stories of fear, uncertainty, and violence seem to surface almost daily, and for some in our wider communities, these are not distant headlines but lived realities.

Across our country, we are seeing how quickly tension can turn into harm—how fear, anger, and division can spill over into acts of violence. Whether the violence is physical, verbal, or systemic, it leaves deep wounds. It unsettles communities. It causes people to withdraw, to grow suspicious of one another, and to wonder where it is safe to stand.

As your pastor, I want you to know that I am aware of the weight many are carrying. I know there are questions, concerns, and emotions that do not fit neatly into conversation or prayer requests. When violence becomes part of the air we breathe, it can be hard to know how to respond faithfully.

In moments like this, I find myself returning again and again to Scripture—not because it offers easy answers, but because it helps us ask better questions.

One of those questions comes from Jesus himself: *“Who is my neighbor?”*

That question feels especially important in a time when violence threatens to shape how we see one another.

Throughout Scripture, God consistently draws our attention to those who are vulnerable, afraid, or overlooked. Jesus reminds us that when we care for the hungry, the stranger, and the imprisoned, we are responding to Christ himself.

Jesus does not respond to violence with more violence. He responds by drawing near to those who are suffering. He responds by refusing to dehumanize. He responds by calling his followers to love—even when that love is costly.

So when we ask ourselves, *“What would Jesus do?”* the answer is rarely simple, but it is consistent. Jesus would notice who is afraid. Jesus would stand with those who feel unsafe or unheard. Jesus would speak

truth without inflicting harm. Jesus would call us away from indifference and toward mercy.

As Christians, we are also shaped by Jesus’ commitment to nonviolence—not as passivity, but as a courageous way of living. Jesus refuses the logic that says violence can heal violence or that fear must be met with force. Instead, he teaches us to respond with restraint, truth-telling, and love that protects life. Practicing nonviolence means choosing words that do not wound, actions that do not escalate harm, and responses that honor the humanity of every person, even in moments of deep disagreement. It is not the easy path, but it is the path Jesus walks, and the one he invites us to follow.

Scripture does not tell us what to think about every issue we face. It does, however, shape how we are called to live: with compassion rather than fear, with presence rather than avoidance, with a commitment to human dignity grounded in God’s love.

Being a neighbor does not require us to have all the answers. It does not require uniform opinions or easy solutions. It does require that we see one another as people—not problems—and that we resist silence when love calls us to show up.

As a church, we are called to be a place where fear can be named honestly, where questions can be asked without judgment, where grief can be held gently, and where compassion is practiced quietly and faithfully.

We are called to pray for those who are living with fear, to support those who feel vulnerable, and to seek justice in ways that reflect God’s mercy rather than the world’s anger.

My hope is that we will continue to hold one another with care in the days ahead—listening deeply, learning thoughtfully, and choosing love even when fear feels easier. May we keep asking ourselves Jesus’ enduring question: *Who will act as neighbor?* And may our life together bear witness to the God who draws near, even in a world marked by violence.

Please know that you are not alone in what you are carrying. I am grateful to walk this journey of faith with you.

According to Wikipedia, in his writing and preaching Meyers emphasizes the humanness of Jesus and the literary (rather than literal) nature of the Hebrew Scriptures and the New Testament, stating that: "I seek to build, not a collection of believers, but a beloved community devoted to embodying peace and justice". Meyers contends that Christianity "was once, and must be again, about following Jesus, not about worshipping Christ." He calls on modern Christianity to return to the core beliefs and practices of the early Church by focusing on faithful practice and social justice rather than right belief. Meyers describes his approach to Christianity as "non-literal, non-dogmatic, and profoundly subversive." What would that kind of church look like in Fond du Lac and beyond? Join us as we explore Pastor Meyer's ideas for the church of today and tomorrow.

February Resolution Reset

New Years' Resolutions are typically statements about what people believe they need to change to become a "better" person. This highlights what the individual perceives as their negative traits, character flaws, or shortcomings.

With Lent starting Feb 18th, it may be a good time to hit the reset button and recognize the positive thoughts and actions that guided behaviors over the past year. Then think about the positive energy and skills that make you smile and feel good about yourself. This is self care. If you want to fast from something during Lent, I read a suggestion to "Fast from Noise". Go into silent spaces away from the news, tv, your phone, and internet distractions and just be. Who knows what your heart may hear (?)

February is Heart Month - Physically, Mentally and Hallmark-y. There are so many things that are good for your heart: physically being active, avoiding nicotine in any form, eating a variety of non-processed food, stress management, staying connected, slow deep breathing, and even encouragement. *Check out the bulletin board for more information about heart care.* Hallmark wise, this may be a hard time for those grieving a loss, experiencing health changes, and/or away from loved ones. Reaching out in friendship is good for everyone's heart...

Holy Reminders and Nagging... The cold/influenza/RSV/Norovirus/Strep season started in January and (I predict) will continue through February. Pilgrims' standard operating procedure during this season consists of masks available at 2 entrances, handwashing reminders and hand sanitizer throughout the church for your convenience and safety. Viruses spread before the person has symptoms themselves. The goal is to not be a spreader or on the receiving end of that spread. If you are not feeling well - even just a little bit unwell - or are concerned about getting sick, please worship online. No worries. No guilt. No judgement.

Managing Medications

The average number of prescription medications that people over the age of 50 take is 4...that's the *average* number, and does not include supplements or over the counter medications. Here are some important steps to help keep track of it all:

Keep an updated list of everything you take, including prescriptions, over-the-counter medicines, and supplements – even if you only take them infrequently. Keep this list in a place that is easy to find and take it – with the actual pills/liquids - to your health care appointments.

Talk with your health care provider or schedule an appointment with a pharmacist at least once a year for a medication review.



Ask about possible side effects whenever you start a new medication.

Take unused and expired medications to a drug drop box - don't save them for "just in case".

Notice how you feel. If you experience dizziness, drowsiness, or anything unusual, write it down and share it with your health care provider.

Take your time when standing up in the morning or rising from a chair. Moving slowly can prevent sudden dizziness, falls and consequences.

Over the years, the kinds of prescription medications, over-the-counter medications and supplements have grown exponentially and there are side effects to all of them! Pharmacies carry many types of inexpensive aides/boxes to help in setting up and remembering to and when to take medications. Everyone has their own system, but if yours works *most* of the time, please ask for help in finding one that works *all* of the time!

Church Council Meeting

December,15, 2025

The meeting opened with the acknowledgment of a quorum by Jim Bentley and Prayer by Pastor Jeannie at 6:00 PM.

Secretary's Report: With corrections for the November minutes, Avery made a motion to accept the corrected minutes, Fran seconded the motion, minutes passed with Unanimous Consent.

Treasurer's Report: Report attached. Assets have increased as have offerings. Fran made a motion the report be accepted, Steven seconded the motion. Motion passed with Unanimous Consent.

Pastor's Report: Report for November 15 – December11th attached.

Vice President's Report: None

President's Report: There are 2 annual motions which need Council approval.

Jim made a motion that the Church Council designates that portion of Pastor Jeannie Douglas' "Housing Allowance" in the budget, which will be approved by the congregation at it's Congregational Meeting on February 1, 2026, and any subsequent amendments to provide for her housing and related expenses. Wendy made the motion to accept this go on to the Congregational Meeting for approval. Steve seconded, Motion passed.

The Church Council authorizes the Treasurer and assistant treasurers to execute standing resolution forms at National Exchange Bank and Trust, Wells Fargo Advisors, and such other financial institutions as may be appropriate; authorizing the Council President, Church President, Church Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurers to sign checks and conduct other routine church business. The Treasurer can access the information in the Church's checking accounts (currently operating, SCRIP, Memorial, and Trust Funds) as needed to coordinate financial activity. Fran made the motion, Patty seconded the motion. Motion passed with unanimous consent.

Search Committee: Neal Seiglaff presented the Conference guidelines for compensation for a Settled Pastor. Jim and Neal discussed the increase in insurance as well as housing and an experience factor. There will need to be an increase to our budget once a settled pastor is found.

Jim made a motion that the monies be transferred as requested. Donna seconded the motion. Motion passed with unanimous consent.

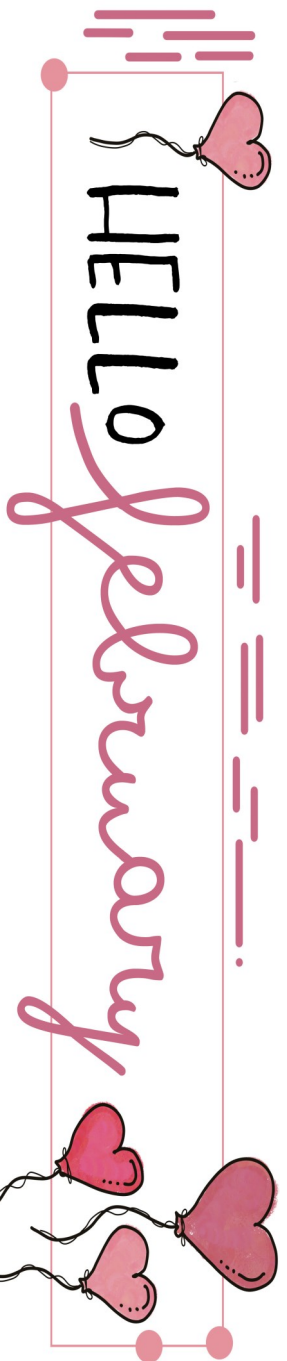
